Spring clean-up

Each spring, City staff organize a spring clean-up to help tidy up our community after a long winter. Whether you come alone or bring some family or friends, everyone is welcome to join us on Earth Day, April 22 from 8 a.m. to noon and help pick up litter from some key locations around the city. If you'd like to participate, meet at the Parks Department office at 192 Old Wellington St. S for a quick safety briefing. Woodstock Transit has provided a bus to take people to the clean up locations. Please wear weather appropriate clothing and closed toe shoes. We'll supply the bags, safety vests and gloves. A free BBQ lunch will also be provided for volunteers after the clean-up.

"It's wonderful to watch families connect with each other while being part of something that allows them to give back to the community," said Reta Horan, Supervisor of Parks and Forestry for the City of Woodstock. "I love hosting this event because you get a real sense of the care people have for the place they call home."

Tree planting

Another event coming up in April is our annual Arbour Day tree planting. The event takes place April 29 starting at 8:30 a.m. Come on out and help plant new trees off Tamarak Boulevard, at the top of Burgess Park.


Make sure you're wearing weather appropriate clothing and boots or shoes that can handle a little mud. Participants are also asked to bring a shovel, a bucket to help carry mulch and gardening gloves if possible, however the City will have some supplies available for those who can't bring their own.

"Tree planting is another rewarding event to be part of," said Chris Kern, the City's other Supervisor of Parks and Forestry. "The connections kids make when planting trees is like no other. They are literally putting down roots in our community. I've seen kids name the trees they plant and come back to visit them year after year."

Trees are a living asset for the city and offer tremendous benefits that grow over time. Trees are also essential in combating climate change. The tree canopy helps reduce erosion by slowing falling rain and their root systems help water absorb into the ground. Trees additionally absorb and store greenhouse gasses and will help keep our cities cooler.

Sikh heritage comes alive in Woodstock

Over the last decade, Woodstock has seen a surge of people from diverse cultural, ethnic and religious backgrounds as the city's population has grown.

According to the 2021 census, nearly 7 per cent of Woodstock's population identifies as South Asian. Today over 3,000 South Asian people call the Friendly City home, compared to less than 400 in 2016. Punjabi is spoken in 1,375 households, while more than 1,700 households practice the Sikh faith.

Woodstock Museum NHS curator Karen Houston said the museum wanted to connect with these growing communities through a new exhibit on Sikh heritage.

Organized by the Sikh Heritage Museum of Canada, Sikhs in Canada is a timeline exhibit that traces 200 years of history. The exhibit is on display at the Woodstock Museum until April 29, 2023.

"We know the demographics of Woodstock are changing in the present and will affect the future, but it's important to remember this story of migration and change is much, much older," said Houston, who is also the Manager of Culture for the City of Woodstock. "As a museum we need to tell many different stories, but remember they are Canadian stories and part of our history."

Sikhism is a religion founded in the Punjab region of India in the 15th century by Guru Nanak.

In 2013, the Ontario government proclaimed April as Sikh Heritage Month. April is when the Sikh community celebrates Vaisakhi, a spring festival that also marks important events in the religion's history.

Savrup Saran was a high school co-op student at the Woodstock Museum last year and had the opportunity to research Sikh heritage in connection with the exhibit during her placement.

"To see the Sikh community represented through the Museum was nice and then connecting that with my own life was really cool," she said. "I know a lot about Sikh heritage in general from my parents, but not as much about Canadian Sikh history, so it was really interesting to learn more about that."

Saran was also invited to research her own family for a presentation to the Oxford Historical Society on March 29 at the Museum.

"I wanted to focus on that common immigrant Sikh story. There's so much heritage and so many stories," she said. "Sikh heritage is different for each family, but in my family, it goes back so far and in so many different locations from India to Fiji to Canada, and that same heritage lives through me and my brother today."

Celebrating the Thames River and Earth Day!

Take a break from the entrapments of our hectic world in the months ahead. Are you familiar with the Thames River in Woodstock? So many opportunities await... a leisurely afternoon of fishing, kayaking or canoeing, or a weekend of camping at Pittock Conservation Area, which might be the perfect staycation for local residents! Catch a glimpse of an Osprey, Bald Eagle or one of many other species as you turn your gaze to the skies. Soak in (pardon the pun) the picturesque surroundings and wildlife activity as you relax on the banks of the Thames River; you will be sure to capture the perfect photo or video to mark your visit. Enjoy a picnic with family or friends, or take a hike, jog or bike ride on the nearby trails, at which time you will be sure to encounter fellow nature enthusiasts.

The banks of the Thames and its sprawling parkland hosts many community events, such as the Children's Water Festival and the Woodstock Dragonboat Festival.

There are endless opportunities to enjoy all our natural environment has to offer. Yet we must challenge ourselves to respect our natural world as we interact with it. Issues of littering, as well as landscape and habitat degradation place added strain on these systems. To better protect and appreciate our waterways, the Canadian Heritage River System (CHRS) program was founded. Since 1984, 41 rivers have achieved this unique and important designation, including the Thames River. The designation process involved the collaboration and coordination of many community stakeholders across the 273-kilometre length of the Thames River. The ultimate goal is to honour, maintain

and preserve the river's natural, recreational and cultural features through continued community involvement and environmental stewardship initiatives.

This year's cleanup falls on Earth Day, April 22. Earth Day was first held in 1970 and has grown to include the participation of over 190 countries. Key objectives include conservation activities, raising awareness about climate change, and encouraging volunteerism and personal stewardship for the good of our communities and the planet. Both the cleanup and Earth Day can boast some resounding success stories!

Woodstock has been involved with the Thames River Cleanup since 2000, with various organizations, schools, groups, families and individuals pitching in! The event is not limited to cleaning our waterways, riverbanks and adjacent trail systems; it is a chance to embrace our natural surroundings and enjoy the company of others who share a common vision, that of a caring and responsible community. It is our hope that you will want to join us in planning for and participating in this opportunity to celebrate both the Thames River and Earth Day. CON IALES

CoW Tales is a regular feature in What's On Woodstock designed to celebrate the City of Woodstock's rich history. Thanks to the contributions of the Woodstock Museum NHS, the Heritage Advisory Committee, and the Oxford Historical Society, CoW Tales shares stories that help us understand and connect with our past as our community continues to grow and evolve. This issue includes some recent acquisitions to the Museum's collection.



A Woodstock Wren

Mary Helen McClelland was part of the Women's Royal Canadian Naval Service. The WRCNS was established in 1942 in the midst of the Second World War and members were known as Wrens, a name adopted from the British Women's Royal Navy Service. Wrens took on a wide range of jobs including cook, steward, stenographer, telephone switchboard operator, motor transport driver, coder and more, Basic training was completed at HMCS Conestoga in Galt, Ontario. Mary Helen McClelland also trained as a coder at the Signal School at St. Hyacinthe, Quebec. She was stationed at Sydney, Nova Scotia, for one year and was posted to St. John's, Newfoundland, an overseas location since it was not yet part of Canada. By the end of the war, more than 6,000 women had served and the WRCNS was officially disbanded in August 1946.




Bringing home the dough

Did you know bakeries used to sell tokens that could be exchanged for loaves of bread? Some bakeries like R.H. Harrison Bakery in Woodstock sold the tokens, often at a discount, as a way to encourage customers and secure payment in advance or in part payment to suppliers. Tokens could be redeemed for one loaf or two loaves. There was also a half loaf denomination because loaves were often baked in a shape that could be easily split in half before the advent of sliced bread in the 1930s, R.H. Harrison Bakery operated in Woodstock from 1903 to 1932. In 1954 it was renamed Harrison's Bake Shop and continued to operate for another 10 years.



Nurturing nurses

Woodstock has a long history of training nurses, beginning in 1895 when the old Woodstock Hospital opened on a hill between Riddell and Wellington streets. A nurses' residence called Patterson House was built in 1914 and the first formal class of students was accepted in 1930. Classroom teaching was done on the first floor of the west wing and was later moved to the basement of Gissing House. an additional nurses' residence. In 1962 the Ethel M. Finkle building was opened to house the new School of Nursing, built to accommodate 25 to 30 students each year with up-to-date facilities. A new residence named Vance House was opened in 1968. The nursing school continued until 1974, when the Woodstock campus of Fanshawe College opened its own school of nursing.



From department store to art gallery

Lieutenant Colonel John White emigrated from Scotland in 1860 and opened a dry goods store with his brother George at the corner of Dundas and Riddell streets. The John White & Co. store expanded following George's retirement, eventually spanning three buildings from 445 to 449 Dundas St. The business incorporated in 1904 and became the John White Co. Ltd. With major renovations in 1913, the three buildings were joined to become a single modern department store, complete with an elevator and pneumatic tube system. It was also the first business in Woodstock to have electric lighting. After 100 years in operation, the store was sold to Walkers in 1961. The building was given a new life when it purchased by the City of Woodstock in 2009 and became the new home of the Woodstock Art Gallery, which opened its doors following construction on July 19, 2011.

Investing in our future

In November 2022, we asked residents for input about some of the core services the City provides in our first asset management survey. Your feedback helps us understand more about our current level of service and what matters to you related to our core infrastructure assets including our road network, bridges and culverts, as well as the stormwater network.

Currently in Ontario, municipalities must have an approved asset management plan for their core assets as part of a phased in approach to improving asset management across the province. By 2024, approved asset management plan must include all infrastructure assets and identify current levels of service as well as the cost of maintaining those levels of service.

The feedback respondents shared with us will help define our current levels of service, shape the City's long-term planning and establish future levels of service in line with our community's expectations.

What we heard

Approximately 200 people responded to the online survey. Some key findings from the survey revealed that:

- More than 75 per cent of respondents have lived in Woodstock more than 10 years
- 87 per cent of respondents believe that climate change has an impact on City infrastructure
- However, flooding does not appear to be a major concern for those who responded, with approximately 50 per cent reporting that they rarely or never see flooding and that catchbasins in their neighbourhoods are clear of debris in the spring and fall seasons.
- Traffic flow, availability of bridges during construction season and overall pedestrian safety were some of the concerns expressed by respondents.

"This feedback is very helpful to help align activities and investments with people's priorities and expectations," said Bassel Agroam, the City's Asset Management Analyst. "For example, 47 per cent of respondents stated that they are dissatisfied with our current pavement conditions, however the Roads Needs Study that we undertake every two years shows that Woodstock's road network scores average to above average compared to similar sized



municipalities. This suggests we may need to adjust our service level expectations in this area."

Later this spring, residents will be asked to provide input on some of the City's other service areas, including corporate facilities, recreational and cultural service areas throughout the City. The survey will be available at www.letstalkwoodstock.ca and residents can subscribe to the page to receive an email when it goes live.

Asset Management Plan – A plan that offers datadriven guidance to manage an organization's capital asset portfolio, and addresses key areas such as levels of service (LOS), risk management, and asset management strategies.






